

Sandra Izzo: Food Focus - Water



Most of us are aware of the importance of drinking enough water. Getting our daily requirement of water helps our organs perform their functions, keeps our skin clear and hydrated, and allows physical action in our bodies to flow smoothly. Even with this knowledge, it can still be challenging to drink all the water our bodies deserve daily. Those who are not drinking enough

may experience poor digestion, sluggish thinking, skin breakouts, headaches, bad breath and general fatigue.

To start your day right, set a large glass of water by you bed each night and drink it when you wake up. When the first thing that flows through your body each morning is water, it pulls out toxins left over from the previous day and freshens your system for the day ahead. Keep a bottle of water accessible throughout the day, whether you are on the go or at a desk. Having one close by will remind you to take a sip when thirsty. The first sip will usually let you know how much more water you need. A sip or two may be enough, or you may need a big glass. If you drink most of your daily water before early evening, you most likely will not be thirsty before bed. This is good, because drinking before bed, and then waking to use the bathroom, disturbs your peaceful night's sleep.

What about quality? Some people like bottled water, while others prefer filtered water. The key is to like the taste of the water you are drinking, and the water should agree with your body. If the taste of plain water is unappealing, experiment to see how you can make it tasty and drinkable. Adding a few mint leaves, a wedge of lemon, a sprig of parsley, slices of cucumber, a twist of lime or a squeeze of orange are great ways to make water more tempting or to jazz up your water routine. Also, drinking tea or juice and eating raw fruits and vegetables contribute to the hydration process.

Recipe of the Month: Ginger Drink

Prep Time: 7 minutes; Cook Time: 24 hours; Yields: 6 - 8 servings

Ingredients

- 1 pound fresh ginger root
- 2 liters of water
- Juice of 2 limes
- Maple syrup or agave nectar to taste



Directions

1. Thinly peel the fresh ginger, grate and mix with water in a large sauce pan.
2. Bring to a boil and simmer for 4 minutes. Cover the pan, turn off heat and leave for 24 hours.
3. Strain the liquid through a fine mesh sieve.
4. Add the lime juice and maple syrup or agave. Still until dissolved. Serve chilled.

Tea Kills GI Germ. A new study indicates that the special **polyphenols** in tea can protect us from bad bacteria in our intestines. In a cell culture, researchers found that a weak solution of tea polyphenols greatly inhibited the growth of E. coli, salmonella, and other bad bacteria such as bacteroides and clostridium. However, the good "probiotic" bacteria were not affected at all, but could continue to grow without the competition of bad bacteria. That's an excellent combination of effects, and a great example of Nature's ability to balance things out.

Fred Quinn spends most of his time composing, collecting and listening to stories. He performs in schools, nursing homes, at outdoor festivals and for community groups.





Renowned Cape Cod painter **Carl Richards** will return to his childhood home, now the Riverdale Art Center (RAC), for a retrospective art exhibition of his collective works from February 4 through March 28, 2010. A natural born artist since the age of four, Carl ran the Richards Funeral Home next door to the RAC with brother Lee until he suffered a near-fatal stroke ten years ago. That near-death experience was transformative: at first, he was unable to see colors. Richards left the funeral business to live in Cape Cod and pursue his passion for art with a profound reverence for the natural world. He specializes in abstract, vibrant paintings using acrylic and oils.

Now fully recovered and a very successful painter, Carl saw a newspaper article about The RAC opening and offered to hold his first New Jersey show right here—is his ancestral home. It will indeed be a homecoming for Carl and a dream come true for him to fill The RAC with his paintings.



The Carl Richards retrospective art exhibition, *More Than Meaning*, will run from February 4 through March 28 at The Riverdale Art Center. There will also be an artist’s reception held on Saturday, February 6, from 4 to 7 PM. The RAC is located at 2 Newark Pompton Turnpike.

Carl Richards is currently a member of the Cape Cod Art Association, and is associated with Barnstable, Creative Arts Center, Cape Museum of Fine Art, Star Gallery and the Harvest Gallery. 
